iGaming Drives Property Tax Relief to New High IFO

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The Commonwealth provides property tax relief to owners of homestead and farmstead properties through Act 1 property tax reduction allocations. These allocations come from taxes imposed on slots play (in-person and interactive) and are distributed to school districts in the fall. For fiscal year (FY) 2024-25, \$800 million in property tax reduction allocations will be available to school districts, an increase of \$132 million (20%) from the prior year and the largest allocation since enactment of Act 1 of 2007. The first substantial increase in allocations occurred in FY 2022-23 (+25%, see table). Prior to that year, allocations ranged from \$525 to \$535 million per annum. The recent increase in allocations coincided with strong growth in new tax revenues from interactive gaming (authorized by Act 42 of 2017), while tax collections from in-person slots play were largely flat.

For FY 2024-25, the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) data show that there were 2.64 million homesteads and farmsteads approved for property tax allocations (excludes Philadelphia), with an average reduction of \$303 per recipient. The table on the next page displays county detail for allocations in FY 2024-25, the number of eligible recipients and the estimated average reduction per recipient. The homestead/farmstead counts are based on FY 2023-24 final General Fund budgets submitted to PDE by school districts in October 2023. For FY 2024-25, the data show that the top three counties in total allocations were Allegheny (\$95 million), Montgomery (\$73 million) and Bucks (\$51 million). The top three counties in average reduction were Monroe (\$700), Cameron (\$491) and Susquehanna (\$452). The bottom three counties in average reduction were Juniata (\$133), Franklin (\$142) and Cumberland (\$167). Average property tax reductions can vary between counties due to various factors. For example, each school district is assigned a property tax reduction index by PDE that is based on its residents' personal income, the equalized millage rate and the market value/personal income aid ratio.² In general, school districts that rank high in equalized millage relative to personal income metrics will receive larger average reductions.

¹ Excludes funds for Philadelphia School District wage tax reduction (\$131 million) and expanded support for the Property Tax Rent Rebate (PTRR) program (\$204 million).

² Equalized millage is calculated as a school district's total property tax remitted divided by its total market value. The market value/personal income aid ratio represents the relative wealth, compared to the state average, for each pupil in a district.
